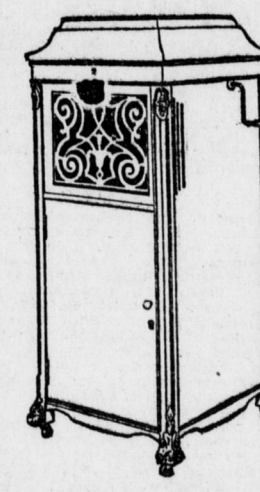

**POLICE GUARD OIL PLANT** Bayonne, N. J., Oct. 10. — Armed policemen to-day guarded the local plant of the Standard Oil Company where a strike was called which was said to affect more than 3,000 men or about half the employees. The strikers demand wage increases of from twenty to thirty per cent. A trolley car carrying men to work to-day was attacked with stones but no one was seriously hurt. Officers of the company said they would continue to operate if the strike did not spread.

New York, Oct. 10.—Inability to provide for herself and her invalid mother has led Miss Clara Bishoff, of Greenport, Long Island, to make an unusual offer to marry any honest and respectable man who will provide for her and her mother. Miss Bishoff makes the offer in good faith. She and her mother are now living in two rooms in the basement of a doctor's residence in Greenport. The girl has been unable to find employment and in desperation decided to make the offer of marriage as the only way out of her difficulty. "I know this public offer to marry any man who will provide for my mother is startling," says Miss Bishoff, "but I was desperate. I cannot support my mother by my own unaided efforts. I cannot even leave her to go out to do what work I could get to do. Situated as I am, I meet no eligible man, so I thought I would make my proposition a business one—telling what I could give as a wife and what I should expect from a husband—in the hope that it would appeal to some man who wanted a good housekeeper and a good, thrifty wife and was willing to pay for them."

### 13th Penna. Regiment at El Paso After 6-Day Trip

El Paso, Tex., Oct. 10.—After being on the road for six days, the Thirtieth infantry, Pennsylvania National Guard, arrived late last night from Mount Gretna. The trains were sidetracked at Camp Stewart, and the soldiers remained on board. This morning they will go into camp with the Second Brigade, Brigadier General Albert J.
