MAIL TREATMENT CHANGE PROMISED

Allies' Reply to Interference Holds to Contention of Right to Search, However

Washington, Oct. 13. — Radical changes in the treatment of mails on neutral ships are promised in the reply of the British and French governments to the American protests against interference with mails. The changes, while short of an abandonment of the contention of the right to search, are regarded by the allies as sufficient to meet the wishes of the United States. Otherwise the two notes which are now under consideration at the State Department are devoted to an extensive academic discussion of the whole subject of the treatment of mails in time of war with voluminous quotations from the history of the American Civil war and of other wars up to date.

PLUMP FOWLS OBTAINED BY CRATE FATENING PROCESS

Crate fattening of fowls produces larger gains and slightly better condition of fleshing than pet fattening. It is also cleaner, since the droppings fall through the slat, or wire bottom preventing soiling of the feet and feathers of the fowls and insuring clean feed.

PAWNBROKERS WARNED BY COURT

Judge McCarrell in Juvenile Sessions Urges More Care in Dealing With Children

Sharp warning to pawnbrokers and their clerks to exercise special caution in accepting articles for pawn from youngsters was issued from the Juvenile court bench to-day by Additional Law Judge S. J. M. McCarrell when a clerk from a nearby pawnbroker's shop was peremptorily called in to explain why he accepted a curious old heirloom from a 15-year-old youngster. The boy's father had the youthful defendant arraigned because he declared he "could do nothing with him." The boy's latest escapade had been to steal and pawn a \$30 watch, a gift to his sister from her grandmother. He got \$2.50 for it. That a clerk should be so careless in accepting a pledge from one so young aroused the ire of Judge McCarrell.

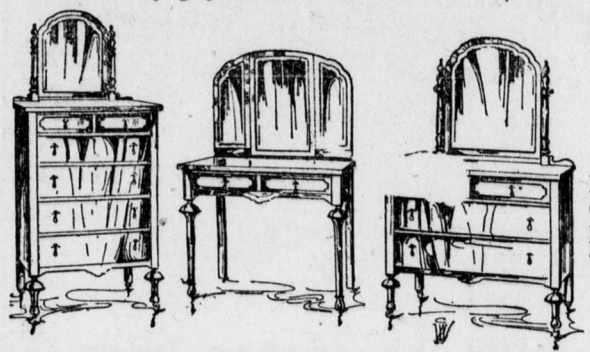
