CHURCHES GIVE FOR ARMENIANS

Pastors to Make Special Appeals in Response to Request For Relief

Pastors in many of the city churches in response to the proclamations setting aside to-day and to-morrow for contributions for the relief of suffering Armenians and Syrians will make special appeals to the members of their congregations at the services to-morrow to give funds for this purpose.

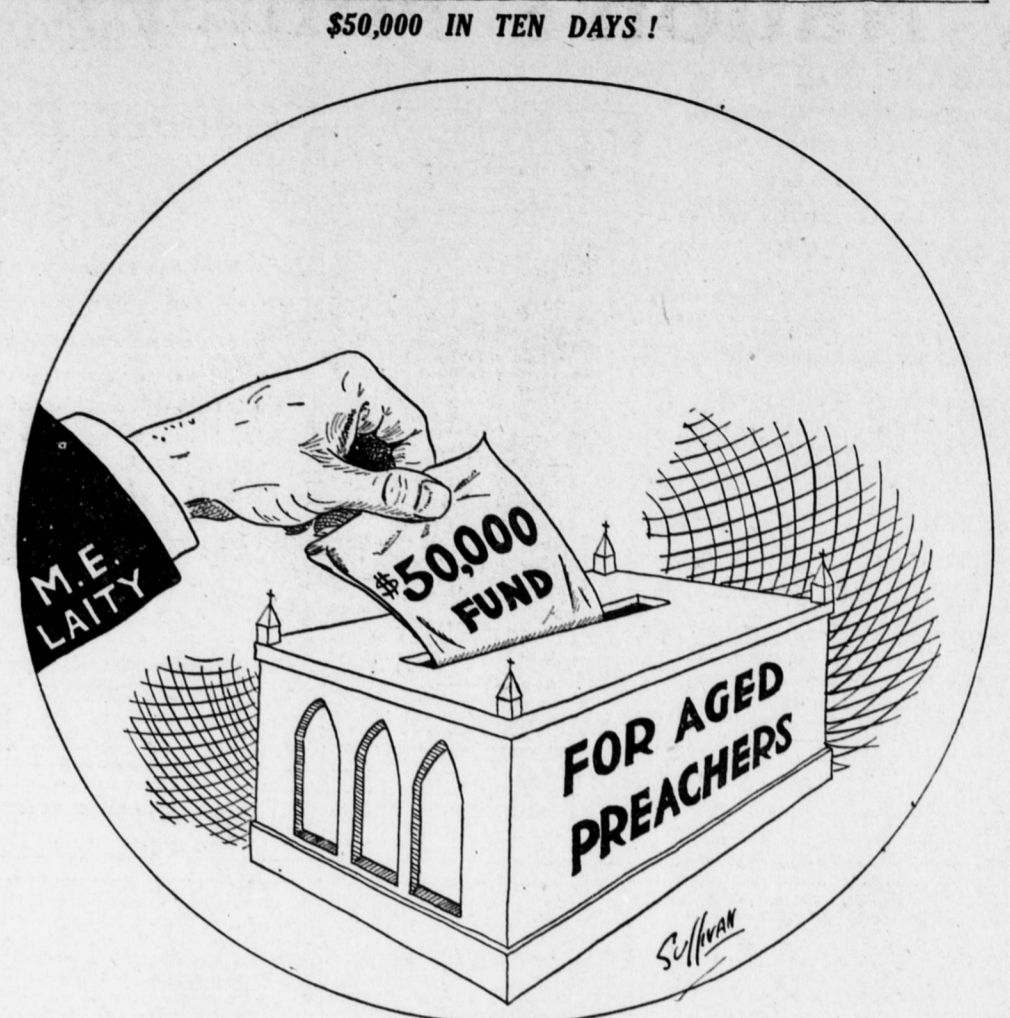
The movement is a nation-wide one, started by a proclamation by President Wilson after it was endorsed and recommended by both branches of Congress. Everywhere in America the appeal is being responded to.

Governor Brumbaugh recently issued a proclamation calling attention to the one of President Wilson, and shortly afterward Mayor E. S. Meals, of Harrisburg, made a direct appeal to residents of the city.

The executive committee of the Ministerial Association of Harrisburg and vicinity last week issued a statement endorsing the campaign and asking all ministers of the association to appeal to the congregations. Every class and creed in America is co-operating.

Every effort is being made to raise \$50,000 for the immediate relief of the destitute people of these two countries and to prevent the actual starvation which one million Christians in Asia Minor are now facing.
