His companion, Jasper Fletcher, aged 17, was ordered to be kept in jail pending a further investigation. A decision in his case will be given Friday.

Fletcher said he had only known Miller for a short time. The latter confessed to being arrested for forgery in the South and having served a term of imprisonment. The men were given separate hearings by Justice J. B. Martin, who conducted the trial.


