As it is they must attend the Wormleysburg High school two years and then go to Harrisburg where they have to drop back a year on account of our term being shorter. In this way they must attend the Wormleysburg High school two years and the Harrisburg High school for three years to get a first-class High school education, under present con-ditions, and it costs the district to keep the pupil in school five years, where it would only cost for four years, if we had a joint High school." 


