#### Issues of Other Companies Deriving War Profits Active

New York, Oct. 28. — Copper shares and the issues of other companies deriving large profits from foreign contracts form the basis of today's short session, rails, even the minor issues, showing relative inactivity. Total sales New high records were made by Utah and Chino coppers, also Central Leather and Cuban Cables. Preferred, Atlantic Gulf and West Indies was again in demand with some of the equipment issues, but Petroleum, Pittsburg Coal, the Motors, Western Union and National Biscuit yielded one or two shares. States Steel was under moderate restraint with other recent favorites. The closing was irregular. Total sales were estimated at 550,000 shares. Bonds were lower.
