MASS MEETING AT MARYSVILLE

Enthusiastic Republicans Hear Speeches at Diamond Hall From Candidates

Marysville, Pa., Oct. 31.—An enthusiastic Republican mass meeting was held at Diamond Hall here last evening with a big crowd present from town and the surrounding towns. About 150 came from Duncannon with the Duncannon band. The Marysville band also furnished music during the evening. The meeting was held at the conclusion of a parade over the principal streets of the town.

District Attorney James McKee, of New Bloomfield, presided and introduced the speakers of the evening. E. K. Focht, candidate for Congress, delivered the principal address, speaking on the "Eight-Hour Law." Addresses were also made by State Senator Franklin Martin and J. S. Eby, candidate for the Legislature.
