MINERS DEMAND ALL GET BUTTONS

Union Men at Brookside Collieries Quit Work Pending Satisfactory Settlement

UNION WILL HOLD OUT

Rumored That Company May Close Mines and Refuse Employment to Several Hundred

Tower City, Pa., Nov. 4.—On Tuesday morning all the employees of Brookside Collieries gathered at the top of the slopes while a committee of the union went to the office and asked the officials whether they would discharge the men who had no buttons, saying that the rest of the men would not work unless they did. The company refused to send the men home. A vote was taken whether the men would work or not and it was unanimously voted to go home. About twenty men at East Brookside went down to work and six at West Brookside. At the meeting of the union on Wednesday night it was decided to hold out until every man had a button and then make arrangements for work. Nearly \$300 came into the union in back dues and admission fees. There are only about ten men in this union that are not paid up. Rumor has it that the company will not allow its men to go back when they are ready but that they will have a general shut-down.—Mrs. Machamer in stepping on her front porch slipped and fell on her arm, breaking it.
