WILL EDUCATE UNION MEMBERS

Plan to Establish Scholarships at State College For Men and Women

State College, Pa., Nov. 17. — The Pennsylvania State Federation of Labor purposes establishing at the Pennsylvania State College forty scholarships for the education of skilled tradesmen and women who are members of labor unions. At the State College the young student will receive special training, which added to their practical trade and industrial experience, will enable them to serve as teachers in the continuation and vocational schools of the State.

J. H. Maurer, of Reading, president of the federation, and a member of the State assembly, and R. J. Wheeler, of Allentown, were here to-day arranging details of the proposed plan with Dr. E. E. Sparks, president of the college. They will recommend the adoption of the project to the executive committee of the federation. The proposed plan provides for the students' training to be financed by an endowment fund of \$25,000 to be raised by the labor unions in the first, second and third class cities of the State. The fund is to be held in trust by the State College to be loaned to students who may become teachers in the continuation or vocational schools of Pennsylvania.
