

TECH FOOTBALL MEN GET HONORS

List of Scholastic Awards Shows 70 Per Cent. of Squad With High Marks

Arranged in alphabetical order the five students who lead the senior class at the Technical high school with first honors are Stewart Blair, Musser Miller, Gilbert Stewart, Lester Wolf, and Lester Zimmerman. Reports for the first month's work have been sent to the parents this week through the mail, and show that there are at present more students on the Tech honor roll than ever before.
