





AWAIT FEDERAL

Hoof and Mouth Disease

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 28.—Facing the possibility of a renewed outbreak of the hoof and mouth disease, livestock men here awaited with some anxiety Found at Last. Shows Results in to-day the outcome of the Federal diagnosis of suspected herds in Mis-

to-day the outcome of the Federal diagnosis of suspected herds in Missouri, Kansas and Nebraska.

Dr. S. L. Bennett, head of the Bureau of Animal Industry, in Chicago, with Dr. F. C. Day, Federal veterinarian, and Dr. F. S. Mather, an expert in stock plagues, left here last night to look at suspected cattle in the Kansas City yards to-day. Results of the inoculation tests, however, will not be known for several days and it is expected the Kansas City quarantine will rémain effective until then.

Meanwhile authorities here announced that the precautionary measure taken by Dr. O. D. Dyson, state veterinarian of Illinois, prohibiting the shipment to the stockyards of Chicago and East St. Louis, except for immedaite slaughter, of any cattle, swine or sheep from Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska, will not be rescinded until all possible danger of infection is believed past. Officials of the Chicago Union Stockyards and Transit Company asserted also that their embargo order against livestock from all points west

of the Missouri river will be effective as long as it seems necessary as a pre-cautionary measure.
