Hints of Some Legislative Inquiry Into Methods of Spending Appropriations

The State Commission of Agriculture is in session at the Department of Agriculture to-day to frame the budget for the Department for the year 1917. It is understood that the Department, which turns in a big sum of money every year in the form of licenses for ozo and other things under its supervision, will ask for some increases including the proposed bureau of marketing, extension of the orchard supervision and inspection to-day and other matters much discussed.
