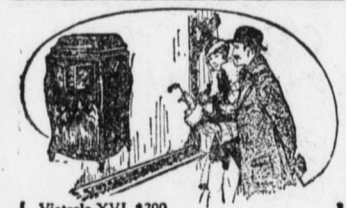

WED IN HAGERSTOWN

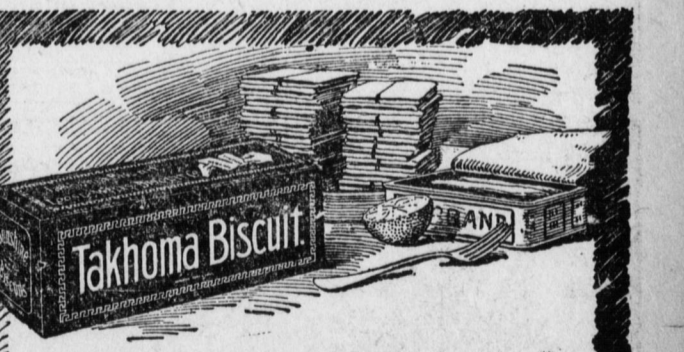
