New Cumberland, Pa., Dec. 13.—On Monday the New Cumberland National Bank paid out \$19,000 from its Christmas savings fund.

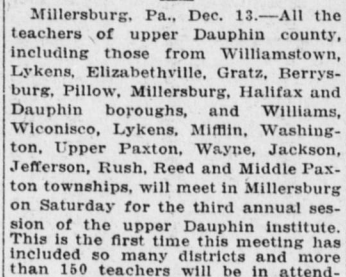
UPPER DAUPHIN CO. INSTITUTE

"Certain Asiatics" Barred From U. S. Shores by Senate

Washington, D. C., Dec. 13.—After another day of debate over the exclusion of aliens on account of race the Senate adopted by a vote of 42 to 14 the committee amendment to the immigration bill, which would bar Hindus and certain other Asiatics, without mentioning them by name, with an added provision stipulating that nothing in the act shall be construed to repeal any existing law, treaty or agreement which serves to prohibit or restrict immigration.

"WANTED CARTE BLANCHE"

Amsterdam Says German Offer Has Sinister Purpose Back of It. Amsterdam, Dec. 13.—The Telegraf, commenting on the German peace offer, says: "It is meant partly to convince the armies and peoples of the Central Powers that peace is impossible because the Entente rejects all the proposals and therefore the supreme command must be given carte blanche in the prosecution of all further requisite measures to persuade neutrals to grant Germany carte blanche in all the fruitfulness necessary to produce peace."

CAR STRIKERS DIVIDED

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Dec. 13.—Striking carmen do not view with satisfaction the demands of the United Mine Workers and other labor unions that the trolley strike be brought to an end at once on the terms laid down by the miners' committee. There is a division in the ranks of the strikers.

He said that there was every prospect that the bills introduced by Congressman Fitzgerald, of New York, and Congressman Farr, of Pennsylvania, would be defeated. The announcement was pleasing to the administration.
