HELP POST OFFICE HANDLE BIG RUSH

You Can Assist Tired Mailmen If You Will Follow Instructions

To facilitate the handling of Christmas mail and to prevent congestion during the holidays, Postmaster Frank C. Sites issued a list of instructions to the public, which, if followed, will aid materially in giving better service. Parcel post matter must not exceed 94 inches in length and girth combined; fourth class matter in first and second zones must not exceed 50 pounds in weight; and in other zones, not more than 20 pounds. Produce should be marked when packed as "perishable," and articles of glass, crockery, toys easily breakable, framed pictures and other similar gifts should be carefully packed in boxes of metal, wood, leather or corrugated pasteboard. All articles should be packed or wrapped securely to prevent any possible damage in handling.

People are urged to mail packages early as Christmas and New Year occur on Monday. All parcels may be sent special delivery and if sealed or otherwise closed against inspection are subject to first class rates of postage. Christmas stamps or stickers should not be placed on the address side of mail matter and care should be taken not to seal packages with them.

In addition to the name and address of the sender, which is required, it is permissible to write or print on the covering of a parcel of the fourth class matter, or on a tag or label attached thereto, the occupation of the sender, and to indicate in a small space by means of marks, letters, numbers, names or other brief description, the character of the parcel, but ample space must be left for the full address and for the necessary postage stamps. Inscriptions such as "Merry Christmas," "Please do not open until Christmas," "Happy New Year," "With Best Wishes," and the like, may be placed on the covering of the parcel in such manner as not to interfere with the address, or on a card enclosed therewith.
