MUTINY STORIES ARE ROT SAYS CAPTAIN SCHELL

without foundation and is based on a trifling incident magnified by the imagination of an irresponsible writer who had been previously censured for falsifying. It happened this way. The Eighteenth regiment paraded past the Eighth celebrating their orders to go home, the bands playing and the men crying: "We're going home; we're going home." To which some of our men, all in good humor, began to reply, "We want to go home, we want to go home." Here and there in the company streets men took up the cry and just after drill there was a boisterous but good-natured demonstration by a few men, to whom Colonel Finney personally spoke. Following this there were more celebrating with some noise making, but it was all in the nature of a lark. A few of the men went beyond bounds and they were either confined to the guardhouse or fined in company streets. But even the men who were disciplined strongly resent the stories sent north. There is no truth in them.

Regiment Above Reproach
"The patriotism and contentment of the Eighth is something of which Pennsylvania may be proud," said Captain Schell. "The regiment is better equipped than some of the regular regiments here. It has plenty of clothing and is eating the best in the land. The esprit de corps and devotion to duty of the Eighth are wonderful and beautiful and the discipline and excellent above reproach. I have read the news dispatches since I came north. There was no demonstration, no marching, nothing in front of the Colonel's tent or anywhere else."

Captain Schell, who has been pronounced by Lieutenant-Colonel Kemper and others who have written home to friends as the best regimental supply officer at the border, brought home since interesting data showing how well the men are cared for.

Good Clothes
These accounts, taken from the official records, show that since he went South, Captain Schell has procured

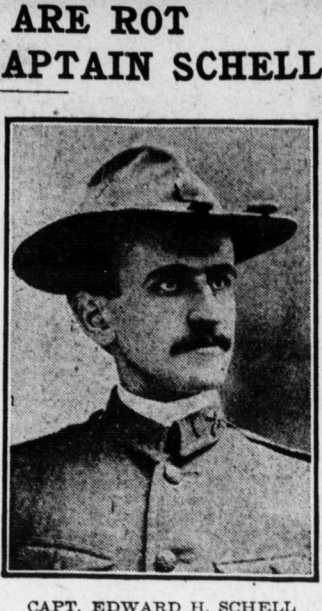

for the regiment, beside what they had when ordered out, clothing to the amount of \$60,682.55, an average above that which the ordinary man would have spent for the same in that period had he remained at home. Every man has a sweater in addition to the regular army overcoat and ample changes of both underwear and outside garments. One man, for instance, has ordered and received one new suit, two new pair cotton breeches, two new pair woolen breeches, one service coat, one woolen coat, one hat, ten pair drawers, three pair gloves, three pair leggings, four flannel shirts, five pair shoes, thirteen pair woolen stockings, and ten undershirts. Most of the men have drawn less than their allowances, which they have found more than ample, and are saving the money, which will be held to their account by the government and given them in cash when they are mustered out.

Plenty To Eat
Every man sleeps in a large, roomy tent, floored with boards and equipped with an air-tight camp stove. Each has a cot and three heavy blankets and the food is as good as at home, although often not quite of home variety.

Captain Schell, who will leave for the border about January 5, brought the following letter to the editor. The Colonel's letter:

"1. For the information of the public and to correct erroneous impressions that apparently exist in Harrisburg, bearing upon the conditions at Camp Stewart near El Paso, Texas, it is my desire that you advise your readers as to the following:

"2. Under General Orders Nos. 42 and 47, War Department, current series, provision is made for the financial relief of enlisted men having dependent families, i. e. wife, children or dependent mothers. These orders have been read to every man in the regiment and method of procedure to obtain relief explained to them by their company officers, applications under the order were made by men as early as September 15, and of the eighteen applications filed with the Depot Quartermaster, Washington, D. C., by one of the companies, thirteen were granted, two refused and three remain unacted upon at this date. Men are filing applications daily, the money in case of claim being valid and within the provisions of the order is forwarded from Washington direct to the family of the soldier. Printed applications have always been on hand and readily obtainable upon request at the adjutant's office of this regiment and method of procedure to get headquarters in each company is also a copy of the orders. Any deserving case is granted by the war department and their handling of applications is fair, prompt and liberal. It is not the purpose, however, of opening the fund as a grab-bag and any attempt to do so will meet a just rebuff. There is no disposition on the part of the government to delay action on applications; rather the reverse, but it is useless to file claims that are excessive in amount or undeserving. It is the interest of the families that have no other income except the pay of the soldier, adequate for the support of his family, and the amount in any case will exceed what the soldier was contributing to the support of his dependents June 18, 1916.

"3. All of the above is thoroughly understood by the commanders of this regiment, who were early in receipt of the War Department orders and early provided with all necessary blanks by myself. The receipt to-day of letters from Harrisburg and an article published in one of the city papers show that some one at home harbors the idea that the officers are not alive to the interests of their men or are lacking in efficiency. It is rather surprising that we must look back to our home locality for the only hint or suggestion reflecting upon the intelligent administration of the affairs of this regiment. It is a well established and generally recognized fact that the Eighth Pennsylvania Infantry is better equipped and supplied with all the necessities and comforts than any other National Guard regiment and most of the regular regiments on the border. The issues of food and clothing have been fully up to the needs and all of the companies have money savings on their rations. We are one of very few regiments provided with a cot, blanket and three blankets for every enlisted man. This regiment was the first regiment in the Pennsylvania Division to receive from the Federal Government in this camp, a large pyramid of squad tents, sufficient in number to accommodate every enlisted man. Over eighty per cent. of these tents were floored almost immediately after being received and erected early last summer, and are all now provided with stoves. All men have in addition to the two olive drab uniforms, extra breeches, ample supply of shoes, suitable underwear, sweaters, overcoats and woolen gloves.

"4. Harrisburg should feel that the interest of her young men now serving here are identical with the interest of their officers and that the officers are constantly on the alert for anything that may be developed to the men's comfort and needs. Also, that department orders are received here and carefully read and digested before they reach the public and if action is necessary, such action is promptly taken.

"5. If recruiting is opened for this regiment at the United States Army recruiting station in the city, it is urged that all young men of good moral character avail themselves of the opportunity to connect themselves with one of the Harrisburg Companies of the Eighth, D. I., headquarters supply or machine gun companies, all of which will be located at Harrisburg, after this tour of duty, as permanent National Guard organizations. There are also a few enlisted men needed in the medical corps of the Eighth and young drug clerks are especially acceptable, although any young man who desires to learn the work of first aid and sanitation will be taken care of to his advantage.
