"I do not know whether you are aware of it or not, but Harrisburg is organized in regard to about as many industries as any place I know of in Pennsylvania," said a man whose business it is to keep track of labor conditions. "I doubt if many people know that the unions are as strong as they are in this city. If you will get a line on the halls about the city which are used for the meetings you will be surprised to see how much they are used on Sundays, which are the big days for meeting. If you will look in the city directory you will get some idea of the extent of the labor organizations. There are scores of them. The railroad men's organizations here are known all over the State for their numbers and businesslike management of funds and benefits. Then there are organizations in all the building trades while the barbers, the stage hands and others in line of activity of which you do not know much and whose numbers apparently may be few which are strongly organized. Some of these unions are old organizations and they have invested funds of considerable size. Their memberships comprise the older men of the trades as well as the younger and they do a vast amount of good among themselves of which the average man knows nothing.
