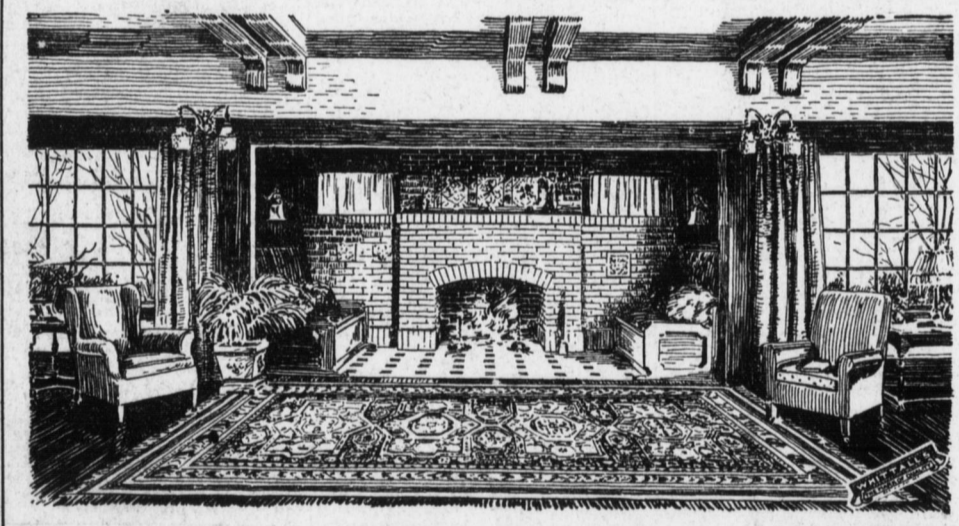

NEGRESS FIRST WOMAN IN GRIM CHAIR'S SHADOW

Mary Washington One of Eleven to Face Jury on Homicide Charge
For the first time in many years a woman must answer to twelve of Dauphin's good men and true for the highest crime against the State when Mary Washington, a negress, is tried on Friday, January 12, to the charge of killing her one-time lover. She will be the first woman in Dauphin county to fight for her life in the shadow of the electric chair.
