The Sara Lerner orchestra played a most entrancing dance program for the many dancers.

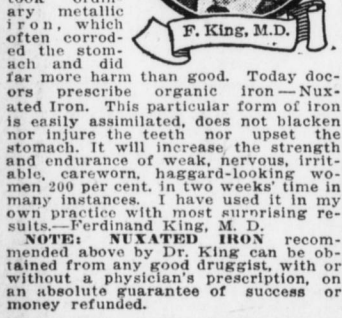
