END ORS PLAN FOR PIGGERY

Grand Jury Recommends Action For Almshouse Improvements Now Pending

Dauphin county's grand jury at the close of its January quarter sessions heartily endorsed the plan of the Poor Directors for building a new cold storage plant and piggery at the almshouse.

In its quarterly report the grand jury highly commended the method by which the jail and the almshouse are conducted.

The high light of the closing session of court was the arraignment of Lewis H. Faust, who pleaded guilty to twenty-eight charges of burglary.

Ed. Bradley, one of the four negroes convicted of shooting a negro in a North Seventh street house which the police know very familiarly as "The Bucket of Blood," was sentenced today by President Judge Kunkel to pay a fine of \$5 and to serve from fourteen months to two years in the Eastern Penitentiary.
