THE LEMONADE BATH

Travelers leaving Germany these days, when they are fortunate enough to pass the rigorous quizzing necessary to secure passports, are treated to a lemonade bath. The letter recites in detail a vivid tale of massacre in the interior of Turkey when men and women persisted in maintaining their religious beliefs and refused to change their names.
