

Blue Sky Laws of Three Western States Are Upheld

Western States Are Upneta Washington, Jan. 22. — Blue sky laws of three States, Ohio, South Dakota and Michigan, designed to curb sale of fraudulent securities were today upheld as constitutional by the Supreme Court.

The court held that authority exercised is not in excess of Stat's "police powers," and that the law is not a burden upon interstate commerce in the sale of stocks and bonds.

NEURALGIA AWAY

London, Jan. 22. — The scarcity of foodstuffs in Germany, especially in Berlin, is increasing, according to an Amsterdam dispatch quoting Berlin newspapers. From December 23 to December 25, according to the dispatch the maximum supply per head was three pounds of potatoes and four pounds of kohlrabi. From December 24 to December 27 rations of seven ounces of flour were available, but for an entire week the consumer could only get three ounces of butter and no margarine.

The dispatch says that people applying for popular feeding in Berlin increased last week to 22,000 and restaurant keepers informed their customers that they may bring potatoes to the eating houses where they will be cooked for them. Owing to the shortage of coal, theaters and restaurants are said to have been insufficiently heated in the last few days and many people who attended the theaters are reported to have sat through the performance in fur coats.
