

## CUT REQUISITION FOR INADJUTANT WORK

### County Commissioners Grant Only Part of Increased Funds Asked

In executive session yesterday afternoon Dr. H. M. Stine, C. C. Cumber and Ex-Sheriff H. C. Wells, county commissioners, approved requisitions for 1917, cutting \$1,000 from the additional sum asked for prison inspection and \$5,000 from the amount asked by the County Poor Directors.

Provision was made also for the expenditure of at least \$10,000 to re-copy and re-index some of the older records on file in the office of County Recorder James E. Lentz. This work will be completed during 1917, as a number of the files are badly worn and must be replaced.

Although the balance in the county treasury at the close of business for 1916 is \$23,000 in excess of the total amount of appropriations, it was needed to defray additional expenses which must be paid by the county.

## "Splendid Policy, Nobly Expressed" Is English View of Senate Talk

London, Jan. 22.—The Manchester Guardian commenting on President Wilson's speech to the Senate, calls it a "splendid policy, nobly expressed."

The speech in form was addressed to the Senate, but it equally concerns ourselves and our adversaries in the war. The President has no intention of taking any part in the actual negotiations of peace, he leaves wholly to the belligerents.

After quoting the chief points in the President's speech, in regard to the conditions on which peace must be based, the Guardian continues: "Not Patience to Some."

"It is a splendid policy, nobly expressed. How will it be received? By the peoples everywhere we cannot but be men of good will and enlightenment everywhere not less fully and with a clear perception that this is no vision of Utopia, but a well thought out and justly framed scheme for the future of the world."

Referring to the President's "noble concluding words," the Guardian says: "The world will find an echo in many hearts and words are sometimes deeds."

## WORLD CONSIDERING WILSON'S LAST NOTE

Europe with the most profound interest in the effect his pronouncement may have upon the governments and peoples of the warring nations, he awaits with equal eagerness the verdict to be given by the American public after mature deliberation upon the course he has championed before the world.

The President is said to believe, however, that with a full understanding of his reasons for holding that it would be impossible for the United States to remain neutral, even though great war and a realization of the part their country can play in advancing civilization, these difficulties will be swept away.

Bitter criticism of Europe and denunciation of the American President for what will be called attempting to prescribe the terms upon which the warring nations shall lay down their arms, is expected. Nevertheless the administration is confident that eventually substantial good will come of Mr. Wilson's unadorned and unadorned speech, that he did not mean to imply that the American government would throw any obstacles in the way of any terms of peace the nations at war might desire.

The peace must provide not only for a balance of power, but a community of power, an organized common peace. It must be a peace without victory, leaving no sting or resentment, a peace between equals.

It must make no distinction between the rights of big nations and of small ones. It must accept the principle that governments derive all their just powers from the consent of the governed.

There should be a united, independent and autonomous Poland. Involuntary security of life, of both land and naval armaments, social development should be guaranteed to all peoples who have lived hitherto under the yoke of tyrants devoted to a faith and purpose hostile to their own.

## STATE POLICE TRAIL SLAYERS OF FOREIGNERS

### Two Alleged Murderers of Duncannon Man Still at Large; One Under Arrest

State police are trailing two of three alleged murderers of George Savage, a foreigner, who was found stabbed to death on a busy street in Duncannon late last night.

The Harrisburg police have been asked to co-operate in the search for the murderers and they are making every effort to apprehend them before they are sheltered by their friends.

A suspicious character was picked up this morning by Railroad Officer James Morrissey and City Policeman Paul Schelhas. His head had been bandaged recently and his nose was bleeding profusely. An investigation proved that he had been mixed up in a fight at Steelton, and had just been discharged from the Harrisburg Hospital.

The accused man was taken to Duncannon early this morning and a boardhouse there to remove blood from his hands. He was taken to the Duncannon jail to await further developments.

## French Comment on Speech Sympathetic but Skeptical; Conceptions Are Agreeable

Paris, Jan. 23. (5:45 a. m.)—President Wilson's address to the Senate is printed in full in the most prominent place by all the morning papers and comment as a whole is sympathetic but skeptical. The Petit Parisien says:

"It seems that President Wilson, as in his previous note, has mistakenly placed the states attacked and the aggressors on the same footing, when the distinction was an easy one which he was in conscience bound to make. With that stipulation we can only subscribe to the formula which the President sets forth as a basis of future peace. None of his conceptions can offend us. They are ours. They were ours long before 1917. We certainly will not oppose them. It gives us only pleasure to see that the cause of liberty and justice eloquently upheld by Mr. Wilson. But what will Germany and Austria say?"

"In entire agreement with President Wilson as to the principles enunciated by him, we nevertheless shall believe, until more fully informed, that there is a portion of humanity upon which these principles must be imposed by force; for it would be erroneous to suppose they could be led to accept them from conviction."

The Journal says: "Mr. Wilson is obsessed with the idea of inaugurating for the world a golden age of universal brotherhood. His whole message is dominated by that noble chimera, and that must be the end of it."
