SHOWER FOR BRIDE ELECT

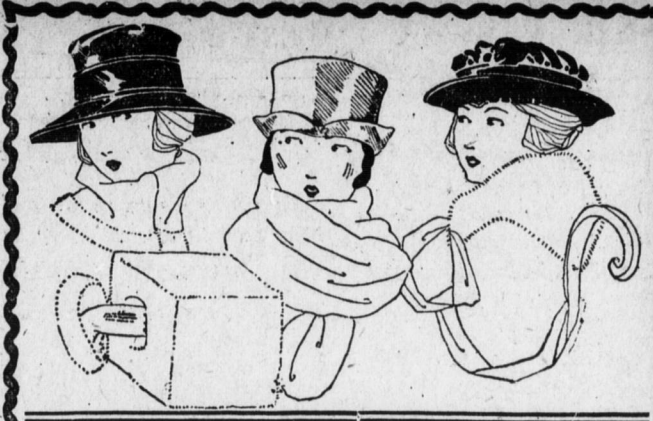
