## RAILROAD NEWS

### COAL LAND TO BE SOLD BY PENNSY?

Valuable Property in Dauphin County Will Be Transferred, Report

Reported sales of anthracite coal lands by the Pennsylvania railroad, include valuable property in Dauphin county.  
According to a report from Philadelphia, the Delaware and Hudson Company has purchased anthracite properties of the Susquehanna Coal Company, located in Northumberland, Luzerne, Schuylkill and Dauphin counties.  
The sale of these lands is made compulsory because of a federal law which prohibits a railroad to have, direct or indirect, interest in any commodity which it transports.  
James Q. Handshaw, agent for the Susquehanna Coal Company in Harrisburg, said to-day that he was not in a position to talk on the question

of sale, or to give any definite figures as to the extent of the anthracite property in Dauphin county.  
Mines are located at Lykens, Williamsstown and in Baer Valley, the latter connecting with Williamsstown by tunnel. There are also large storage yards at McClellan near Millersburg. The Susquehanna company employs about 3,500 men.  
The annual output at Lykens is estimated at 300,000 tons and at Williamsstown, 250,000 tons. The Baer Valley mines have a yearly output of 300,000 tons. At McClellan 500,000 to 600,000 tons of coal are stored each year. A dispatch from Philadelphia says:  
"Mining engineers of the Delaware and Hudson have made a close examination and survey of the Susquehanna coal properties and development. Inventories have been prepared by the Pennsylvania Railroad. The price determined upon and the method of settlement have not become public, but report has named variously \$8,000,000 to \$12,000,000 as the amount involved, and it is suggested that purchase money obligations, maturing serially through probably twenty years, very probably will be issued in payment."  
"The Pennsylvania Railroad ownership in the Susquehanna Coal Company is represented by \$2,136,600 stock and \$3,101,500 of debentures. The Delaware and Hudson made large purchases of anthracite properties in Schuylkill county during a previous administration. Last fall the Pennsylvania Railroad thought to dispose of its Susquehanna Coal Company to the Lehigh Navigation Company, but for legal and other reasons this effort was abortive."
