Until satisfactory arrangements are made to take care of these funds, no final report will be made. Other associations have agreed longer time to consider the merger plans.

That brought an end to Mrs. Canapa's faith in her husband and she had him arrested. Municipal Judge Backus sentenced him to two years in Wauwaton. He had been on probation since April 18, 1916.

Canapa is a machinist, but represents himself to be a salesman and spent money freely on his many women friends, said Theodore Puls, probation officer. Puls referred to him as a "heart breaker."

Canapa told "Mollie" he lived in the Wayland Apartments. So "Mollie" wrote a letter addressed there. Canapa couldn't be found, so the letter was sent to his home. That proved his undoing.

"Why haven't I heard from you?" the letter read. "I have been feeling so blue wondering if anything might have happened to you. I have realized more than ever how much you really mean to me. Now, honey, if there is another girl that has taken my place, please let me know. I hope this is not the case, as it would make me feel terrible."

Miller, Detroit, Mich.; W. C. Knoelk, Waukegan, Ill.; Colonel Russell B. Harrison, Indianapolis, Ind.; H. G. Churchman, Springfield, Ohio; F. E. Stevenson, Paducah, Ky.; L. H. Frantz, Muscatine, Ill.; and I. G. V. Mays, of St. Joseph, Mo., were chosen as organizers of the system in their several States.
