Feb. 16. via London, Feb. 17.—The cold which has held the western front frostbound for nearly a month is gradually moderating and it is easy to sense all along the battle line an unmistakable quickening which tells of the approach of spring and foreshadows the coming to grips of the greatest armies yet assembled in the world war. Already these armies are reaching out toward each other, testing various parts of the lines and attempting to discover the most likely point of contact for the beginning of the titanic struggle that is expected to make this the decisive year of the conflict. In anticibation of eventualities the Germans have removed the civilian populations from the cities and towns in proximity to their line, but no such precaution has been felt necessary behind the allied front.

Guns Roaring Steadily

Never silent, the British guns are beginning to roar more and more steadily. To-night they are booming with particular violence in the sector of the Somme. From a distance the bombardment might easily be mistaken for the grumbling echoes of a passing summer storm. The chorus of guns rises and falls like great peaks of thunder and there are flashes in the darkened sky like the play of lightning along the horizon.

Local Banks Have Not Received New Bank Notes


None of the new one and two-dollar United States notes which

Another institution made requisition several weeks ago for a thousand of each of the one and two-dollar notes although they are not locked for until late next week.

The new notes greatly resemble the one-dollar Treasury notes issued in 1869. One of the new greenbacks attracted much interest in the lobby of the Commonwealth Hotel this morning when a guest who had just arrived from Philadelphia was showing it to some friends.
