

**SCHOOL PROBLEM
MAY HANG FIRE**

**Selection of Architect Will
Await President Stamm's
Home Coming in April**

No action on the selection of an architect for Harrisburg's new high school may be taken until April as a result of the action of city school directors a little more than a week ago, in refusing to elect William B. Itner, of St. Louis, to draw plans for new high schools and alterations to present buildings.

This delay of five weeks may result as A. Carson Stamm, president of the board, and chairman of the special committee to select an architect, is in California and may not return until April 1.

The last action taken, was to give the committee instructions to name a Harrisburg architect together with Mr. Itner, so that the board could select one. Since then it is understood that some of the directors who opposed Mr. Itner will vote for him, if they are assured that the loan of \$1,250,000 will not be overdrawn.

Public sentiment has been aroused in favor of the special committee's report, in which Mr. Itner was recommended. Directors of the Harrisburg Chamber of Commerce at a conference went on record favoring support of the special committee, and the Rotary Club will act on the question.

But with President Stamm out of the city, school officials to-day expressed no hope for action before the first meeting of the board in April. Other members of the committee are not expected to act with the chairman out of the city.

**One of Von Bernstorff's
Secretaries Found to Have
200 Suits of Pajamas**

Harrisburg, N. S., Feb. 22.—One of the German embassy secretaries returning to Germany with former Ambassador Von Bernstorff on the steamship "Frederik VIII" which is being examined here by British authorities on her voyage from New York to Copenhagen, is reported to have 200 suits of pajamas in his possession. In the baggage of nearly every other member of the party, cotton goods known to be scarce in Germany are plentiful, the customs inspectors have discovered. In view of the close association between cotton and explosives it is understood that the examiners will take some of the excess clothing it is understood that the examiners will take some of the excess clothing from the Germans and make an allowance for it.

It is learned also that the Germans are well supplied with gold. As this is contraband, it is believed, it will be exchanged into some form of currency less useful to Germany.
