

MILLERSBURG BRIDGE MOVE

IS GIVEN BIG BOOST AT YEARLY DINNER OF LIVE MOTOR CLUB

Noted Speakers Tell Upper Enders of Good Roads Projects (and Problems; Unique Decorations a Feature; Delicious Turkey Served by Ladies of the Town; Speakers' Table in Form of Bridge

Millersburg, Pa., Feb. 28.—The Millersburg Motor Club, one of the most aggressive and progressive organizations of its kind in all Central Pennsylvania, entertained a party of distinguished legislators and guests at its annual dinner last evening and impressed upon them very strongly the urgent necessity of a State-built bridge over the Susquehanna at that point.

The turkey dinner was prepared by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Motor Club, under the direction of Francis H. Hoy, of Harrisburg, as caterer, and served by the members, under the leadership of Mrs. J. W. Hoffman, head of the auxiliary. Speaker Richard J. Baldwin, in facilitating the ladies upon its excellence, said that some of the legislators at Harrisburg had expressed the belief that large amounts of foodstuffs were being hoarded up in the rural districts, that this he believed was true and that all the good things in the State must have been hidden away in Millersburg, especially for the motor club banquet.

The affair was arranged by H. W. Dowman, president of the club and one of the greatest boosters for good roads in the upper end, assisted by the following committee of arrangements: H. M. Fairchild, chairman; S. N. Kawel, the Rev. W. C. Skeath, A. G. Bashore and James E. Lentz.

Unique Decorations The decorations were white and blue bunting and the room was lighted by long strips of red, white and blue electric lights. An odd and attractive feature was the speaker's table, in front of it, across the entire width of the

room, was stretched from floor to table-top a canvas painting representing the Susquehanna river from Millersburg to Perry county, with piers painted in to the level of the table. Above the level was erected the superstructure of such a bridge as the Motor Club would have erected over the river at the points named. At one end on an electrically-lighted column was the word "Perry," and at the other end "Dauphin." The decorations, which were in charge of E. D. Lutz, chairman; Samuel Krause and Guy L. Heckert, committee, came in for much favorable comment, as did the music rendered by the uniformed boys' brigade band, which played behind a lattice screen at the end of the large hall.

Well-Known Speakers The Rev. Mr. Skeath, toastmaster, was introduced by Chairman Fairchild, and the Rev. J. H. Musselman made the opening prayer. Among the speakers were Richard J. Baldwin, Speaker of the House; Senator C. J. Buckman, chairman of the Senate Committee on Appropriations; Frank B. Black, State Highway Commissioner; William E. McCaleb, superintendent of the Philadelphia Division of the Pennsylvania Railroad; William Ramsey and Harry Heyburn, representatives from Delaware county, and H. P. Lincoln, superintendent of the Williamsport division of the Pennsylvania Railroad, and John S. Eby, representative of Perry county.

The speechmaking was cut short by train time, but not before all of those responding had expressed their keen appreciation of the work being done by the Millersburg club for good roads in the upper end and their interest in the bridge project.

Among the invited guests were William M. Forrest, Deputy Attorney General; Representative Ira E. Ush, Representative David Bechtold, W. R. Denehey, of the Pennsylvania Railroad; Howard W. Fry, of the State Highway Department; C. N. Mumma, deputy county recorder; E. M. Shadle, district superintendent State Highway Department; W. G. Rinecker, of the Pennsylvania Railroad; G. M. Steinmetz, and Senator E. E. Beldeman, who is leader of the Millersburg bridge movement in the Legislature.

TROOP OFFICER GETS PROMOTION



CAPT. EDWIN A. NICODEMUS This morning First Lieutenant Edwin A. Nicodemus, of the Troop C, First Pennsylvania Cavalry (the Governor's Troop), received notification from Major Pick M. Ott, commanding he had been promoted to captain in the quartermaster's department and assigned as aid-de-camp on the staff of General C. M. Clements, commander of the Pennsylvania Division of the National Guard. The promotion dates from to-day. Lieutenant Nicodemus served as an aid to General Clements during the entire tour of duty at Camp Stewart, El Paso, Texas, for the past seven months.

Captain Nicodemus has had twenty-six years' service in the Governor's Troop, having enlisted in 1891. He was appointed troop surgeon, with the rank of first lieutenant, August 1, 1901, and served in that position until May 28, 1910, when he was elected first lieutenant. Captain Nicodemus is an expert rifle shot and competent instructor in small arms practice. For many years he has been rangemaster at the target range at Rockville, where the members of the Governor's Troop and Companies D and I of the Eighth regiment practiced during the summer rifle season.

CROWDED CARS ARE RULED UPON

In ordering improvements to the car service of the Schuylkill Railways Company in the complaint made against it by the borough of Shenandoah, Public Service Commissioner Milton J. Everett says: "No system of railway operation has yet been found elastic enough to have always a proper and sufficient number of cars at the various points of emergency in the service so as to be able to give every passenger a seat."

The commissioner adds: "This inability to provide for special and unexpected crowds on a few hours' notice does not warrant a railway company to neglect the obligation which it has assumed to furnish adequate and convenient service to its regular patrons who come and go daily unless, as in some of our largest cities, traffic conditions are too congested to permit the installation of such service. In the situation presented at Shenandoah there is no reason appearing why adequate car service should not be provided in the morning to carry the miners and other workmen to their places of employment and on Saturdays to take care of the general traffic."

The segregation of the miners by operating special cars or reserving a compartment in cars as suggested by complainant would not work out very well in practice. Miners are entitled to the same privileges as any other passenger and while some miners are favorable to such a plan, says the opinion, the commission has "been unable to find nor does it have knowledge at present of any method by which that end can be attained in a satisfactory manner."

The company is directed to change its service, to install new steps, etc., rehang fenders, replace stoves by more modern methods of heating, and to have conductors pay attention to ventilation and sanitary condition of cars.

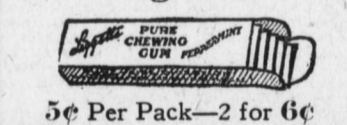

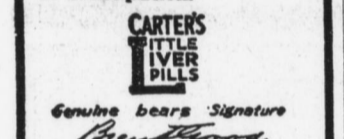

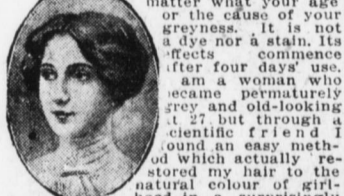
