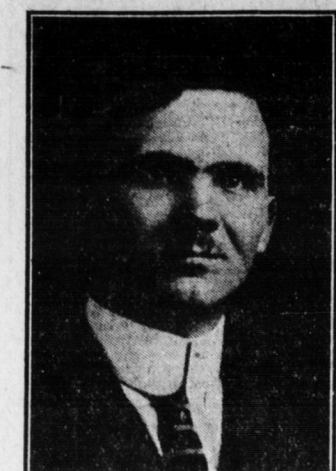

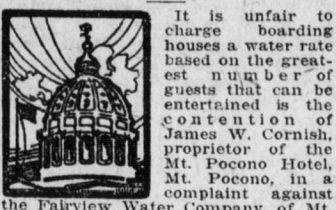

BOARDINGHOUSE RATE QUESTIONED

Unfair to Charge For Water at Rate of Maximum Number of Guests



It is unfair to charge boardinghouse water rates based on the greatest number of guests that can be entertained in the house.

The town property committee was authorized to get bids for the improvement to the Citizen and Paxtang Hook and Ladder houses. These buildings are to be improved so as to take care of the new apparatus.

A report of the auditors was made. Summary of the account follows: Balance in treasury January 1, 1916, \$12,425.45; receipts for year 1916, \$102,373.39; less checks outstanding, \$165.70; balance, \$124,073.09.
