NEXT CONGRESS MAY BE FREE OF PARTY LINES

Big Parties Will Get Together to Prevent Filibusters From Gaining Control

Washington, March 7.—Bi-partisan organization of the incoming House with Champ Clark as speaker and the committee memberships and patronage equally divided, is being discussed by Democratic and Republican leaders as a possibility in the event the five independent members hold up public business in the next session by attempting to dictate how the House shall be organized.

The independent members have declined to align themselves with either of the big parties and have held several secret caucuses. If they vote as a unit, as it now appears they may, they can delay business in the House just as long as party lines are maintained.

No Party Lines

In case of a deadlock, many Democrats and Republicans believe it would be their patriotic duty in the face of an international crisis to break down party lines regardless of political fortunes.

The desire of the House to keep its record clear of any charge of trying President Wilson's hands in the Senate did not prevent a big part in converting members to the bi-partisan proposal.
