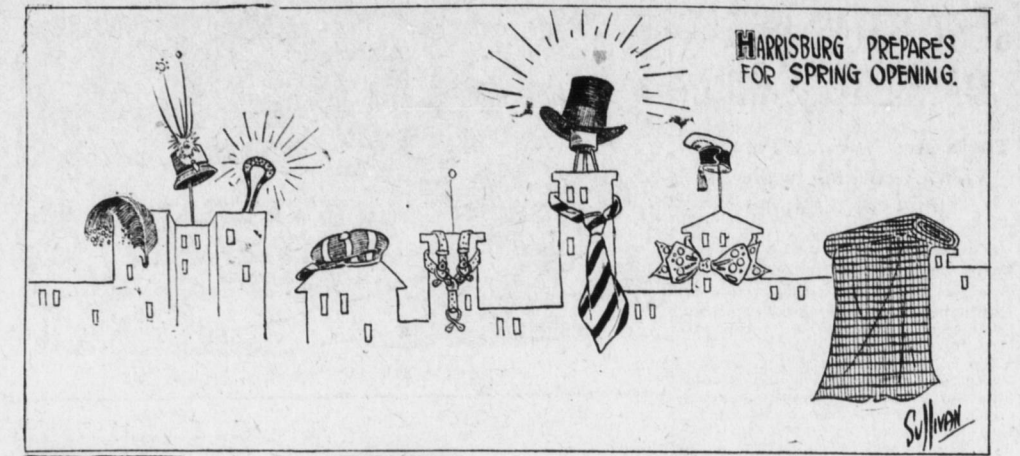

It was also deemed advisable to use this money in the securing of the best talent in the country; to appear at the regular sessions of the institutes.

Superintendent Downes announced that Dr. Reuben Post Halleck of Louisville, and Dr. W. G. Whipple, of the University of Illinois, would appear at the institute next year. These speakers appeared before the teachers during the past season, and created very favorable impressions.
