HOUCK DIES AFTER 50 YEARS SERVICE

Dr. Henry Houck, Secretary of Internal Affairs for the State of Pennsylvania, and one of the prominent and influential citizens of Lebanon, was born March 18, 1866, in Lebanon county, Pennsylvania, son of Samuel and Rosanna (Jontz) Houck.

The early education of Henry Houck was that of most of the country boys of the neighborhood, attending school each year at the district school, later he was sent to the Annville Academy, and he also attended for a term the Arcadia Institute at Orwigsburg, Lebanon county, Pennsylvania.

This was at a time when he himself was teaching and his leisure was scanty. He began indeed, to teach when he was hardly more than a boy, being only sixteen months old.

Being in great demand as a public speaker, he lectured widely throughout Pennsylvania and in many other States. When Dr. M. G. Brumbaugh, now Governor, was Commissioner of Education in Porto Rico, Dr. Houck assisted him in conducting a series of educational meetings, which were held in the principal cities and towns on the island.

Dr. Houck married, April 10, 1886, Susan Margaret, daughter of Dr. Christian Bucher, and they had seven children, Harvey Bucher, Mary Valentine, Rosa Jontz, Elizabeth Heister, Paul Winters, Alfred Rhodes, and Susan Margaret Houck.

The death of Al. R. Houck, former postmaster of Lebanon, Republican leader of that county and Chief of the Bureau of Industrial Statistics, Department of Labor and Industry, two years ago, was a blow from which "Uncle Henry" as the Secretary was affectionately known to his more intimate friends, never recovered.

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COUNTERFEITERS BEING HEARD IN FEDERAL COURT

The first cases that were brought to the attention of the grand jury for the March term of the United States court which opened here yesterday were those of the government against A. M. Hornberger of Reading, and Joseph D. Ferry, of Harrisburg. After they had been presented to the jury, evidence was presented in the cases of the United States against Joseph Mealman and Mrs. Hannah M. Smith, both of Chambersburg. All four are charged with counterfeiting, the first two having been implicated in one transaction and the last two in another.

Secret Service Agents McTamney, Griffin, Aher and Schroeder gave testimony in the cases against Ferry and Hornberger and Schroeder had charge of the Chambersburg cases. It was 4:30 o'clock before Assistant United States District Attorney John M. McCourt, who has charge of the prosecution in all four cases had finished his evidence to the grand jury and at that time Judge Witmer adjourned court, announcing that the jury should withhold its report on all cases until court reconvenes to-day.

It is alleged that Hornberger, who is an engraver, made plates from which \$10 and \$20 counterfeit bank notes were printed. That Ferry put up the money to secure a printing press and fitted up a counterfeiting plant in a backroom of his garage where the bogus money was made. Also that the two defendants passed many of the counterfeit bills in Harrisburg and other places in that vicinity and that Ferry also distributed bogus money in other cities, including Chicago and St. Louis. Calvin R. Egan, who was arrested in Harrisburg with Hornberger and eFerry on January 11, is said to have passed bills in Philadelphia and other places in the Eastern district and for that reason he is not being tried here, his offenses not having been committed in the Middle district. The printing press, etc., found in Ferry's garage at the time of his arrest, are now in the Scranton court room.

Mrs. Smith on two occasions sent, it is alleged, counterfeit \$10 bills and gold pieces, two on each occasion, to Walker & Co., a mail order concern in Pittsburgh, in payment for goods which she ordered. She says that she got the bills and gold coins from Mealman.

Members of the House of Representatives paid tribute to the memory of Secretary of Internal Affairs, Henry Houck to-day by adjourning after a brief session. The motion to adjourn was made by Mr. Meakle, Allegheny, who announced the death of Dr. Houck, who was one of the most diligent and conscientious of officials.

Speaker Baldwin seconded the motion in a brief address and adjournment was taken at 11:45 a. m. until 10 a. m. Wednesday.

Governor Brumbaugh will be required to fill the vacancy, and Dr. Houck's successor will not be elected until November, 1917. The Governor will name who will serve until May, 1920. It is said that due to the warm friendship existing between the Governor and Dr. Houck, it is thought to the appointment of Paul Houck to fill out his father's unexpired term.

John R. Geyer, who had been a patient at the Medico-Chi Hospital, Philadelphia, for the past four weeks, returned home yesterday.

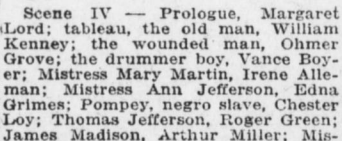
