Prayer For Nation

Rabbi L. J. Haas, of Harrisburg, who offered the prayer at the opening of the House, prayed for divine guidance to the President in the international crisis and that the country should be protected from all enemies.

The "sales in bulk" bill, defeated last week and reconsidered, was passed 166 to 15, after a debate.

The House also debated the Simpson bill to allow county contracts involving less than \$500 to be let without advertisement and postponed it after yoting down a motion to recommit.

The Franklin bill amending the first class city milk law was passed finally. The House passed finally the bill increasing salaries of deputy quarantine physicians at Philadelphia from \$2.000 to \$3.000.

The military code and McVicar jury drawing bills came out of committees. The Snyder resolution for a commission to draft the military training bill was concurred in.

The bill extending the authority of the Philadelphia Department of Public Works over areas within three miles of boundaries was recommitted.

The House adjourned at 10.50.
