Shippings also sagged with Central Leather, Industrial Alcohol and various minor specialties. Following its course of the preceding day, the list scored general recoveries from lowest levels, coppers and marines leading the higher movement before midday. United States Steel was under pressure, however, and rails also sagged on light offerings. The turnover of the forenoon was little more than half of yesterday. Bonds were irregular.
