CHINESE TO REBUILD FORTS Tien-Tsin, China, Mch. 27.—Admiral Cheng Pl-kuang, the minister of the navy, has revived the subject of re-building the Taku forts which were destroyed by the allied forces during the Boxer trouble in 1900. The cabi-net is considering the admiral's, recom-mendation and an effort probably will be made in a short time by the foreign office to gain permission from foreign powers for the reconstruction of the historic forts, which stand at the mouth of the Peibn river leading from Tien-Tsin to the sea. Under the pro-tocol of 1901, immediately following the Boxer trouble, China is forbidden to fortify the mouth of the Peibn. PREFULTIONS FOR BABLES






