

ALMOST ENLISTS; JUDGE SAYS "NO"

Would-Be Soldier Gets Seven-Month Term in County Jail Instead

The United States almost landed another recruit this morning. The Dauphin county jail got the near-soldier instead, and will keep him for seven months.

Guy Wingert, of Williamstown, convicted of a charge of felonious assault on his brother with intent to maim, was before the court for sentence.

The suggestion was then offered to the court to suspend sentence if Wingert could pass physical requirements for the army.

"I don't believe he would make a good soldier," Judge McCarrall remarked. "He doesn't look where he shoots.

William Hurst, brought into court after a capias was issued, was severely reprimanded by President Judge George Kunkel because he was not present when his case was called.

March Breaks Record at Lentz's Office; 215 More Documents Than in 1916
