#### American Freighter Is "Wrecked" on Atlantic

New York, April 4.—The freight steamship Zealandia, flying the American flag, has been "wrecked" according to a cablegram received here by her owners, the Universal Transportation Company, from their agents in Liverpool. All on board were saved, the message said.

The Zealandi left New York March 18 with a cargo of foodstuffs for Liverpool. She was unarmed. Her crew consisted of Captain Henrahan, an American, and a crew of about forty men, of whom 25 are Americans.




