The New army bill has been submitted to Senator Chamberlain and Chairman Dent, of the House committee, and will be introduced in both houses probably to-morrow.

The principal provisions for raising the new army follow:

To Call Guard

Immediate recruiting of the regular Army and National Guard to their full war strength, about 750,000 men, and calling of all National Guard units into Federal service.

Compulsory enlistment to recruit both regular Army and National Guard to their full strength if voluntary enlistments are not sufficient.

Increase of the present authorized war strength of the regular Army and National Guard war strength of the regular Army and National Guard by about 25 per cent. to provide an armed force at once of about 1,000,000 men by compulsory service if voluntary recruiting fails.

Plan Conscription

Increase by compulsory recruiting in increments to about 2,000,000 men within two years.

All new enlistments, it is planned, shall be for the term of war with Germany.

Use of the new officers reserve corps in the additional units and for training purposes also is planned.

While the bill include the principle of compulsory service, no provision for universal training is made as proposed

Shortly after the beginning of the submarine campaign in February, the guards were increased at these places, to prevent any possible attempts of sympathizers with Germany to damage them.
