Mileage Determined by Lightness and Flexibility

How far a car goes on a set of tires is a question of first importance to the motorist. To answer it for their product, the Franklin Automobile Company, has just completed a compilation of averages taken from reports received from owners in all parts of the country. The rough going of the western mountain ranges and the scorching travel through the desert regions of the West are intermingled with records over the macadam highways of the East as well as the tough sand and mud roads of the South.

The records cover the period beginning with 1912 and ending with January, 1917, five years. The grand average for these five years is 10,203 miles per set of tires. The Franklin designers explain this extraordinary mileage briefly, viz.: scientific light weight plus flexible construction. The Franklin is widely noted for its lightness, the touring car tipping the beam at 2280 pounds, with other models proportionately light. This lightness makes possible a flexible, resilient type of construction, for light parts can be allowed much freedom of movement without danger from racking and straining. Another interesting result of light-weight construction on tire wear is brought out by a well-known independent motor authority, who made an investigation of the load tires are made to carry. He says: "I found that what was ordinary tire equipment on some 60 per cent. of the leading cars save a load per cubic inch of tire volume of between 5 and 6 pounds. The Franklin showed the lowest weight per cubic inch of tire volume, .395 pounds." This lightness in weight relieves the tires destructively load and the resiliency softens the blow on the tires. The remarkably long life of tires is not the only result. Punctures are rare and blowouts practically unheard of.

It is singularly the motor for a powerful speed car, equal to any emergency, quick on the pick-up and indefatigable for ranging far and fast with the utmost security. "Owing to the great demand in all other styles the factory is able to build only a limited number of Super-Sixes this year. Many orders have already been placed ahead by motorists, who know the Hudson product.

The Speedster is finished in Cobalt blue with vermillion wheels, and the beveled body edges are finished in black. The wheels are 32x4 1/2 inches. The body is low; the seats are designed for lounging comfortably. "I am confident that the demand for this car will be so great that the factory will be unable to keep up with orders, and as I am desirous of seeing it well represented in Harrisburg, I advise those who are seeking a distinctive open motor to by all means see the Hudson Super-Six Speedster at an early date."
