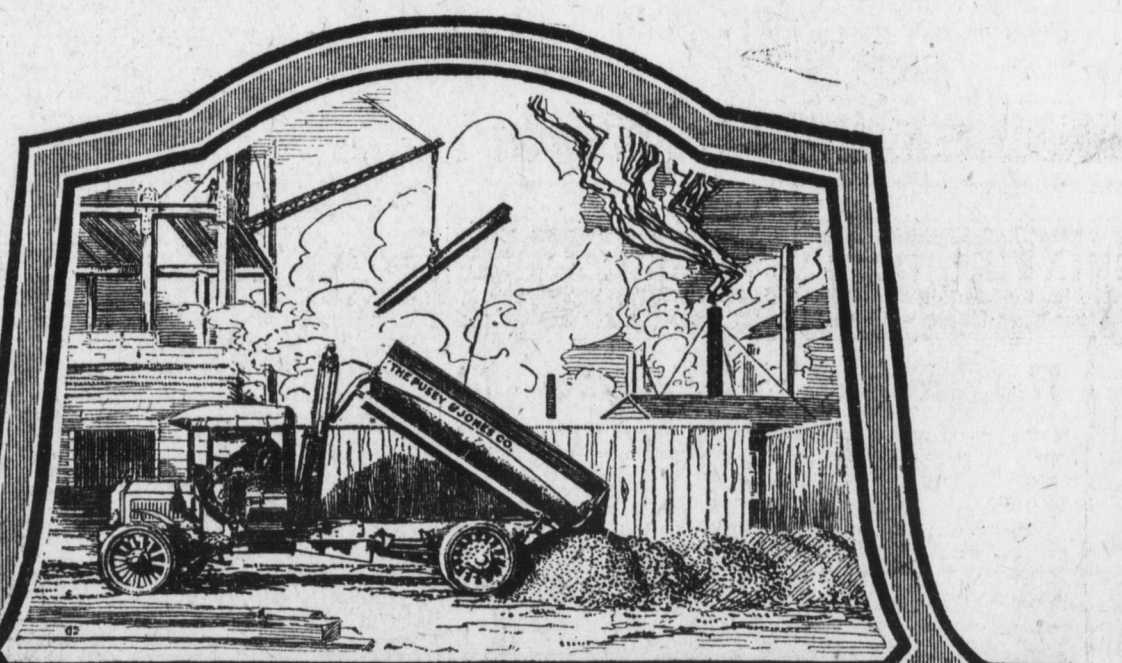
Millerstown Pastor Goes to Charge in New Jersey

Adams County's Gift to Police
Commissioners Increase Gratitude to Gettysburg Borough Officers
FRIENDS HELP FARMER
Raise Purse for Charles Casey When His Home Is Destroyed by Fire
Gettysburg, Pa., April 7.—The Adams County Commissioners have increased their annual gift of ten dollars to each member of the Gettysburg police force to fifteen dollars, the commissioners believing the policemen save the county many dollars in costs during the year by their method of handling minor cases.—Neighbors and friends of Charles Carey, whose home was destroyed by fire, raised a purse of between four and five hundred dollars for him, while articles which he sold at his public sale brought higher prices than was expected, the sale amounting to about \$900 more than had been estimated.—Contrary to the belief of some experts that some parts of the State will be visited by locusts of the seven-year variety, Calvin G.
