TO PROTECT CHILDREN BORN OUT OF WEDLOCK

A bill introduced by Senator Martin, of Philadelphia, makes the wilful neglect by parents of children born out of wedlock a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of \$500 or a year's imprisonment. False statements as to the parentage of such children are punishable by similar fine and imprisonment. The act applies to cases of neglect now existing as well as to violation of the proposed law in the future.

ECONOMY BUREAU PROPOSED

The bill creating within the Auditor General's Department a Bureau of Economy and Efficiency, was defeated in the Senate today by a vote of 15 to 20. Senator Snyder, its author, said that there were not enough votes to put the measure through on third reading and consented to its defeat until a future time, when it will again be placed on the calendar.

BANKING OPINION RENDERED

MARKET PICKS UP AFTER ITS SLUMP

Firmer Tendencies Shown With Demand Heaviest For War Issues; Metals and Shippings Join in Almost General Advance
Philadelphia, April 11. (Wall Street) — Firmer tendencies were manifested to-day's opening, war issues being most in demand. Gains in the first half hour ranged from 1 to 3 points in Bethlehem, Lackawanna and Crucible Steels and Republic Iron, with 1 1/2 for United States Steel. Metals and shippings averaged one point advances with oils, Central Leather and American Can and 2 1/4 for Wilson Packing. Among rails, Delaware and Hudson regained 3 points of yesterday's severe loss with 3 for Canadian Pacific and 1 to 1 1/2 for Union Pacific and leading coalers. Declines were limited to fractions except in Sloss Sheffield which broke 1 1/2 points. General irregularity followed the initial rise, steel and associated stocks losing about half their gains and Delaware and Hudson forfeiting practically all its recovery with variable recessions in other rails. The only pronounced activity was in specialties and pool issues comprising the war groups. Shippings held their early advance and Wilson Packing rose 3/4 with 1/2 for Ohio Gas and 1/2 for National Biscuit. Trading dwindled to extremely moderate proportions at midday. The bond market was confusing, international for the most part, with a slight upward progress, while domestic issues of various descriptions were substantially lower and United States coupon 2 1/2 yielded 5/8 of a point.

LICENSE BILL RECOMMENDED

Senator Buckman's bill increasing the cost of automobile licenses as a means of raising additional revenue, which has been introduced in the calendar, was recommitted to the committee on public roads and highways to afford a hearing of opponents of the measure. The bill makes the minimum automobile license fee \$10 instead of \$5 and increased the fee for dealers' licenses from \$10 to \$15.
