There are men who fight and men who write and each has his part to play as a patriot. But Alfred Noyes is one of those gifted "clings who can do both, and do them well. When forbidden because of defective vision to enlist at the first call of Englishmen to strike a blow for democracy and international law, England's great poet went to the front on his own account and served with the aviators, in the trenches and with the troopers who are chasing submarines. He has had exceptional opportunities to see the war, and he paints facts with such vivid realism

that he carries conviction and stirs patriotism in every hearer. In hearing Mr. Noyes, one not only helps a local organization that is doing a splendid humane work, but aid is given to the cause that is now ours. ROBBED 85 HOMES By Associated Press Atlantic City, N. J., April 12. — Howard France, of this city, was arrested here last night in connection with the robbery of thirty resort homes including that of Judge William Clifton, of New York and Baltimore, from whom he is alleged to have taken jewelry valued at \$3,500. He has confessed to them all, according to the police. He is also accused of robbing eighty-five houses in Philadelphia before coming here. He is said to have posed as a house painter and his activities in this city, the police declare, netted him about \$8,000.

COSTA RICA GIVES U. S. ITS SUPPORT

Another Latin-American Country Declares Against German Policy

Washington, April 12. — Without formally announcing abandonment of their neutrality, two more Latin-American republics, Argentina and Costa Rica, have given assurances of their moral support for the United States in the war against Germany. Argentina, choosing a middle course between those of Brazil and Chile, her sister nations in the in-

fluential A. B. C. trio, has notified the State Department that she "recognizes the justice" of this country's stand against German aggression. The communication contains no intimation, however, that the Argentine authorities contemplate an actual break with Berlin, and it is assumed here that for the present at least neutrality will be observed.

Little Costa Rica, just emerging from the throes of a revolution sent word to her diplomatic representatives here to-day that she endorsed the course of President Wilson and was "ready to prove it if necessary." Argentina's position was defined in a note reaching the State Department to-day in answer to the notification by this government of a state of war. The communication is regarded here as defining a status just short of an open break. Diplomats and State Department officials believe it would have been difficult for Argentina to go further at this time. The position of that government is different from that of the United States and Brazil who have suffered directly from the submarine campaign.

Attempt to Blow Up Train Carrying Munitions of War

Camden, N. J., April 12. — An attempt to dynamite a train of from 20 to 30 cars loaded with high explosives, which passes through here from Pennsboro at 1 o'clock every morning, was frustrated late last night, according to the police.

A pedestrian discovered a man chiseling a hole in the Pennsylvania Railroad elevated bridge over which the train passes. He notified a policeman and on the latter's approach the suspect ran. Although the officer fired several shots at him he made his escape. An examination showed that a large hole had been cut in the masonry. Two companies of New Jersey National Guardsmen were ordered to patrol the railroad at that point. Use McNeil's Pain Exterminator.—Adv.

Ashes of Cremated Woman Buried in Lawn, Wife Seeks Divorce From Her Husband

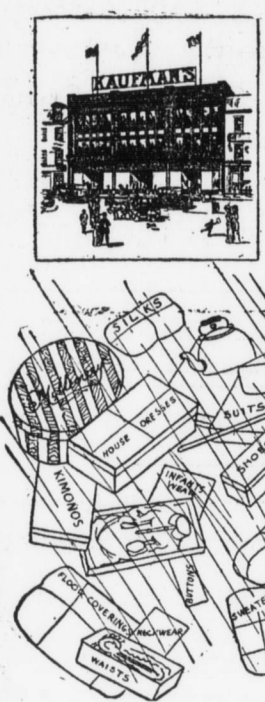
Pittsburgh, Pa., April 12.—Objection was made by Mrs. Matilda E. Heineman in her suit for divorce against Otto W. Heineman, a wealthy North Side jeweler, about her husband's alleged action in burying the cremated remains of a woman acquaintance in the lawn of their home in Bellevue.

The wife testified before Attorney Robin B. Wolf that she did not discover that the ashes of the woman had been buried in the grounds surrounding their home until she learned it from the gardener. It was recommended in the master's report filed yesterday in Common Pleas Court, that the divorce be granted.
