GOVERNOR URGES MORE PLANTING

Letter Sent to the Trustees and Managers of All State Institutions

Governor Brumbaugh last night sent a letter to the head of every State in-stitution having a farm or arable land about it urging that every effort b made to increase the supply of food-stuffs. The Governor's letter also ten-

stuffs. The Governor's letter also tendered the expert assistance of the State's farm advisers.

The Governor wrote:

"Whatever land you have surrounding the State institutions over which you are the legal guardians, I wish you to plant at once with such foods as will be most likely to contribute in a large way to the sustenance of the wards of the Commonwealth in your care, and if possible, to produce a surplus which may be added to the general stores so immediately necessary in this crisis of our Commonwealth and nation.

"You are at liberty to call upon the Department of Agriculture or any other arm of the State government for any service or assistance which you may desire, in order to carry out these provisions."



Be Vacated

Past Supreme Regent Frank B. Wickersham was interviewed to-day on the appointment of a receiver for the Royal Arcanum by the United

on the appointment of a receiver for the Royal Arcanum by the United States district court for the Eastern District of Massachusetts.

Mr. Wickersham stated that the only personal knowledge he had of the appointment of a receiver for the Royal Arcanum he had obtained through the columns of the daily newspapers; that no notice of the intention to apply for the appointment of a receiver had been given by the complainant; that everything was done in secret which at once created a suspicion that the man who made the application was not acting in good faith. "The brother states that he has a benefit certificate for only five hundred dollars which indicates that he belongs to the older members of the society," Mr. Wickersham says, "yet he complains that the Royal Arcanum has been paying too much money to the beneficiaries of its deceased, aged members. es of the society were used to pay the death losses occasioned by the large number of deaths among the members who were sixty-five years of age and older. Furthermore, the complainant asks to have the business of the society wound up and the mohey of the emembers.

"If such practice were adopted almost two hundred thousand members would lose their insurance, and the complainant himself would not receive enough as his share to pay the cost of printing his bill of complaint. "The Royal Arcanum is commercially and actuarially solvent. The report of March 31, 1917, shows that there is now in the emergency fund \$3,107.759.30, and that the society has in the treasury lover and above all known liabilities \$3,653.660.38, and in addition has loaned to its aged members, under what is, known as the half cash payment plans, \$2,897.201.49, so that the society has over six and one-half million dollars assets over and above all known liabilities. An examination of these figures convinces all thoughtful members that the society is perfectly solvent; that it is able to meet all of its demands and will continue to do so for all time to come; that the application for the appointment of a receiver without notice to the officers of the society was without justification, and it is confidently believed that the appointment will be vacated in a very short tine."
