Lafean's Commission to Be Issued at Once

Ex-Congressman Daniel F. Lafean of York, appointed State Banking Commissioner by Governor Brumbaugh on Saturday, will be sworn in tomorrow morning, according to word received here to-day. Governor Brumbaugh is expected to send the order for the issuance of a commission to the new commissioner to the Department of the Secretary of the Commonwealth to-day and Mr. Lafean will file his oath when he takes the oath of office.

The commission has been vacant since January 15, which was after the Legislature had some session, and there is much interest in whether the Governor will send the name to the Senate at once or wait until the end of the session. The Governor's office declined to make any statement in the matter to-day.

Governor Brumbaugh had a big delegation of people, including Senator T. L. Eyle, awaiting him when he reached his office to-day. The Governor has no statement to make regarding the \$2,000,000 bill for defense or the report that his friends were seeking to end the session on May 31.

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TRAINING CAMPS

Leaders of American Army to Drill For Three Months

To obtain the large number of trained officers needed for the initial army unit of 500,000 men and each succeeding unit, the War Department has finally decided to organize officers' training camps, according to an authorized announcement made by the Philadelphia office of the Military Department...

Not as Jews but as Americans was the view that Attorney Robert Rosenberg urged the young men present to take to heart. He said that national lines in standing shoulder to shoulder in the battle for right is the true measure of a patriot and the stand that he urged.
