

INDUSTRIALS LEAD MARKET TRADING

Equipments, Munitions, Metals and Shippings Lead Active Dealings; Steel Hardens, but Rails Are Uncertain

New York, May 1.—(Wall Street).—Industrials of the equipment and munition groups, metals and shippings led the active dealings of today's early market, all being in demand at advances ranging from material fractions to over a point. The inquiry for United States Steel comprised several individual lots up to 17 1/2, an overnight gain of almost a point. Marines, Atlantic, Gulf and West Indies and prominent coppers and motors rose in a way to suggest additional short covering this being indicated also in the further advance of industrial Alcohol. Steels hardened with other specialties but rails were uncertain.

Almost without exception market leaders recorded advances of one to two points before profit taking became effective. Shippings and motors also increased their early advantage. Rails gave promise of general improvement, but sold off abruptly on word from Washington that the Interstate Commerce Commission advises extreme conservatism respecting dividend returns during the war.

GERMAN SHIPS TO CARRY U. S. GOODS

Senator Knox Declares It Is a Crime Not to Take the Step

Washington, May 1.—Every German ship now lying in an American harbor is to be taken over by this government and put into commission to carry food and munitions to our allies in Europe, if the House acts favorably upon a resolution passed by the Senate late yesterday. Boards of survey are to be appointed by the Secretary of the Navy to determine the value of these ships, this information being for use in any judicial action that may be taken after the war.

Senator Knox, of Pennsylvania, precipitated action when he introduced a resolution requesting the President to requisition all vessels of alien enemies of the United States and to use them in the prosecution of the war against the Imperial German Government in such trade and manner as will, in his judgment, best preserve the interests of the United States and its allies.

Senator Knox declared it "would be not a blunder but a crime to hesitate longer in taking the step to meet Germany's ruthless submarine warfare. He called attention to the German committee's announcement that the submarine campaign had destroyed 1,600,000 tons of ships in sixty days and pointed out that there is an "almost equal amount in our ports which should be made the target of these attacks."

"Every hour is important," said Senator Knox, "I hope the President is having these ships prepared now and that they will put to sea at once."

"They are being put in shape," said Senator Smith, of Georgia, "and some of them will put to sea probably this week."

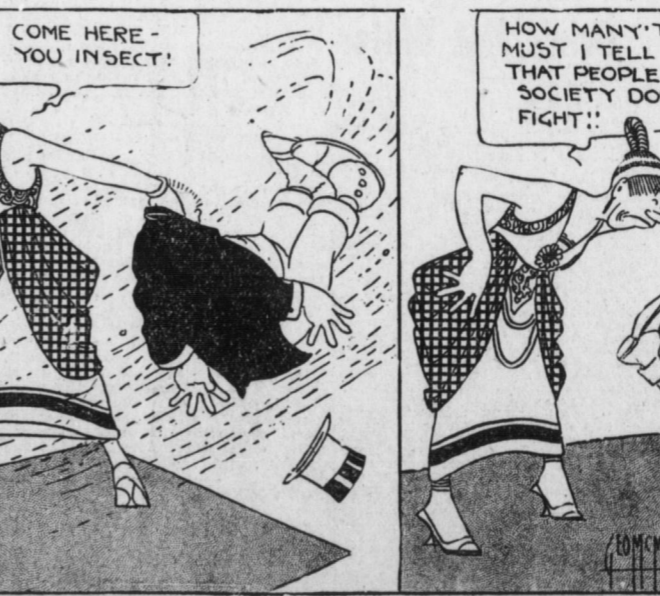
