He takes up cudgels in defense of his own connections with the school board during the period he served as a subagent for the American Seating Company in Harrisburg and says that during that time the school board during that time the school board paid no more for school supplies than if another had been assent, and he asserts that the affairs of the board were better managed then than now. He points to the condition in which the schools were left, the kind of buildings erected and the pay the teachers' were receiving at the time he says he ceased to be a dominating influence in school board affairs.
