FEW TAKEN FOR TRAINING CAMPS

Many Fall Down on Either Educational, Physical or Personal Qualifications

Although there seems to be no end of applicants who have applied and passed the physical tests for admission to the officers' training camps, a bulletin just issued from the Military Training Camps Association Headquarters in New York city, indicates that only a fair percentage of those examined are being accepted, and that there is a likelihood of the camps being opened on May 14 without the full quota called for.

This means that there is a demand for the type of men suggested in the original call, who can qualify from an educational, physical, and personality standpoint to officer troops. If the 2,500 men desired for the Fort Niagara Camp are not selected by May 8, the date set for announcing the chosen list, it is probable that an extension of time may be made for the reception of additional applicants.

Applicants are being advised that a provision for the payment of \$100 a month in addition to expenses, every attendant at camp, and every man who attends camp is certain of a commission at the end of three months, according to advice received from New York this morning.

Men who have taken the examination and received duplicate forms from the local recruiting office are advised to hold them pending notification of acceptance from the commanding officer of the Fort Niagara camp. These forms must be presented for identification at camp.
