### Germans Feel Moral Effect of U. S. at War

Washington, May 4.—Tako Jonesco, the Rumanian statesman, in a statement cabled to the State Department by the American legation at Jassy, predicted the effect of the United States entrance into the war would be to cause doubt in the minds of the German people that they are waging "a war of defense against their neighbors."

"The truth will finally begin to gleam even in those German heads, used to think of politics only by way of an ordnance of police," he said. "Their morale will diminish. The war will be shortened.
