Trading was again light but fairly broad, the inquiry soon extending to various specialties, including Industrial Alcohol. There was less pressure against rails, some of which were substantially higher. Equipments and munitions aleo recorded fractional gains.

Business dwindled for a time after the first advance, but became broader and more spirited toward noon. United States Steel then recorded an extreme rise of two points, Bethlebetter class rails, atlantic, Gulf and West Indies 2½, and Marine preferred, 1¾. All the better class rails, especially Pacificate and coalers, were higher by 1 to 2 points and Mexican Petroleum, Motors and metals were appreciably asbove early levels, coppers receiving further stimulus from favorable trade reports. 
